IFFP ADULT GROUP TOPICS -- JANUARY - FEBRUARY 2007

We have an exciting line up for Adult Group in the upcoming winter months. Please join us and share your ideas for discussion topics, guest speakers and other ways we can liven up Adult Group discussions and make opportunities available for sharing within our community. Feel free to contact Board Member and Adult Group Coordinator **Colette Matzzie** if you would like to help plan Adult Groups or contribute.

In January we will have two tracks running for Adult Group. You can choose where you would prefer to participate.

In the Media Center:

January 7, 21 & 28: *Peaceful Home*, led by Mitchell Ratner, an ordained Buddhist teacher. This series provides the tools to create a peaceful home such as meditation techniques with children, suggestions for celebrations and festivals, parenting practices, etc. The sessions include discussions concerning family dynamics, respectful communication and conflict resolution. Attend all three or drop in on one.

In the Sligo Cafeteria:

On January 7, long-time IFFP member **Terry Fischer** will lead a discussion on the "Phenomenon of Intermarriage." Reading materials will be available in advance to consider the sociological question of whether interfaith marriages "just happen" or whether there are particular choices and social currents that lead us to make the choices we have made for our families.

On January 21, IFFP member **Ron Weich** will host a guest speaker Melody Barnes, Executive Vice President for Policy at the Center for American Progress, on a discussion on "The Role of Religion in Public Life."

Additional January and February sessions include a discussion on "What is Faith and Why Have Faith?", which IFFP member **Jimmy Mrose** will lead. Readings and discussion materials will be circulated in advance as much as possible.

We also hope to have Ann Kline visit with IFFP, to lead a Gathering and an Adult Group. Ms. Kline, a Jewish spiritual director, has been affiliated with the Shalem Institute for Spiritual Formation in Bethesda, addressing group spiritual direction and spiritual guidance programs. She is a contributing author to *The Lived Experience of Group Spiritual Direction* published by Paulist Press in October 2003.

Rabbi Harold White will be back in February to lead Adult Group, on a topic to be announced.

In the spring, we will also offer a three-session series: **Judaism 101** and will continue our Interfaith 101 series.

Thanks to **Susan Mathis** we have recordings of several Fall Adult Group discussions. Limited copies are available for home viewing. Please contact Colette or Susan directly to arrange for a copy of a recorded Adult Group.

MEET OUR NEW MEMBERS

In the October newsletter, we introduced four of fourteen new families who have joined IFFP this year. Below we introduce five more new families to our community. Please extend a welcome to them.

Linda Goldman and Barr Weissman

Barr Weissman grew up in the Washington, DC area, and attended Temple Sinai, a Reform synagogue. His wife, **Linda Goldman**, grew up in an interfaith Jewish and Southern Baptist family, but was raised mostly Christian.

Linda was born in Charlottesville, Virginia, and later moved to Missouri, where she attended the University of Missouri, focusing on radio, television and filmmaking. She came to Washington, DC on an internship with the National Geographic, where she and **Barr** met. The couple are both filmmakers.

Linda and Barr have three children, twin girls, **Grace** and **Sylvie**, who are in 2nd grade, and **Abby**, a 6th grader. They looked around as a family for a few years at different religious institutions, including the Ethical Culture society, where they were married, and a Reconstructionist congregation in Laurel. They decided on IFFP, where they knew several members, including the **Skolnik/McKay** family, **Sandy Moore**, **Marika Partridge** and **Julia Jarvis**, who takes yoga with Linda.

Barr said that they were attracted to the values of IFFP, its non-dogmatic approach to spirituality and Adult Group sessions they've attended with **Rabbi White**.

Jodi Kanter and Robby Jones

Robby was born in Georgia and reared in Mississippi as a Southern Baptist and obtained a seminary degree. **Jodi** grew up in Chicago, where her family belonged to a Reconstructionist synagogue. They met at Missouri State University, where both were professors, **Robby** in Religious Studies and Ethics, and **Jodi** in Theatre and Performance Studies. They relocated to the DC area about 18 months ago. They have bought a home in Takoma Park. Robby currently works with People for the American Way Foundation, but will be joining the Center for American Values and Public Life, focusing on religion and ethics. **Jodi** recently had her first book published and will be joining the communications department of Bread for the World in January.

Robby's daughter from a previous marriage, **Riley**, age 6, loves her IFFP kindergarten class taught by **Rich Shegogue** and **Laura Dunne**. The family learned about IFFP through Google and Jodi's cousin, a rabbi, who knows Rabbi White. All three are delighted to have found IFFP.

Joyce and Richie Lynch

Joyce and Richie are native Marylanders: Joyce grew up in Potomac and Richie in Bethesda. Joyce was raised in a Jewish home that emphasized ethnic identity and cultural traditions more than religious observances. Richie grew up Catholic and attended Catholic school from grades 1-9 and feels closer ties to his religion than Joyce. They met as students at University of Maryland-Baltimore County, where Richie studied imaging and digital arts and Joyce studied social work. They have been married 10 years and have triplets in kindergarten -- Brendan and his two sisters, Hailey and Nicole. They now make their home in Gaithersburg. Joyce is a full-time mom and Richie is art director at a non-profit arts organization. They learned about IFFP through Google when they got married and decided to join now that the kids are of school age. They

chose IFFP because they wanted a place where they could embrace both of their religious heritages as a family, and provide spiritual foundation and a sense of belonging to draw on when "life throws you curveballs."

Ailyn and Bob Schwartz

Ailyn was born in the Philippines and immigrated to the United States with her family when she was eight years old. Raised Catholic, Ailyn grew up in College Park and attended the university there, earning a bachelor's and master's degree in Education. She is currently on leave from her position as a kindergarten teacher at Rosemary Hills Elementary School in Silver Spring. Bob grew up in Delaware and his family attended a Conservative Synagogue. He graduated from the University of Delaware with a degree in Communications and now works as a video producer for NOAA. The couple met 12 years at a rest stop on the New Jersey Turnpike over Thanksgiving weekend. Five years later, they were married. Ailyn and Bob and their two children also live in Gaithersburg. Julia, 3, participates in IFFP's pre-school class and Elena is eight months old. They learned about IFFP from Bob's aunt and joined briefly in 2002, before the children were born. They rejoined this fall. When they first joined, Ailyn recognized founding mother, Stacey Katz, whose daughter, Hannah, was one of Ailyn's pre-school students. Hannah now attends college. Ailyn and Bob feel very welcome at IFFP and look forward to raising the girls in a dual-faith community.

Jimmy and Nina Mrose

Nina, who grew up in New Jersey, is Jewish, and Jimmy, who grew up in the Boston area, is Catholic and continues to attend Mass each Sunday. Nina works at the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and Jimmy, a former partner at a patent law firm, is now a stay-at-home dad. Their three-year-old son Jacob was adopted from Korea, and they will soon be returning to Korea to adopt another baby boy. Jimmy and Nina believe families should practice prayer in daily life, as individuals, together as a family, and as part of a larger community. Accordingly, Jimmy and Nina seek, in IFFP, a community of Jewish and Christian prayer to God, based on the traditional values and practices common to both religions.

WHY WE BELONG . . .



I came to IFFP as part of an interfaith couple: I'm Jewish, he's atheist, Central American, not particularly English-speaking, and vehemently distrustful of organized religion. I could see, as our daughter, Miranda, grew, I was going to need some help in the Bible stories department.

To be honest, it was the Jewish part more than the "interfaith" that I was hoping to share with Miranda. The family I grew up in was largely non-practicing, but my sense of Jewish identity was strong. Part of it was culture and family; I deeply love my New York-centric, Ellis Island-

descended, lox-and-bagels-chewing, reading-and-achieving, loudly argumentative, warm, judgmental roots. But it was also the knowledge of us as a people with a long, proud and significant history: a people who invented one of the most powerful moral codes ever devised; who wrote The Book; who survived the Holocaust. And in my parents' lifetime and my own, the identity extended into the social struggles of the day, with Jews (and our family) being proudly over-represented in the trade union movement, the civil rights movement, the peace movement. My family, the people of the Book(s), an emphasis on ethics and justice -- this, I knew, was too valuable to lose.

That may not be what Miranda gets from IFFP. I rather doubt she is picking up on Judaism as I experienced it; the identity of IFFP is, by definition, as Christian as it is Jewish, so the culture and tone are different. And the sharp edge of ethical teachings that lay at the heart of my family's Judaism seems not so central to this group. Yet what has pleased me is the richness of IFFP's other offerings. I have enjoyed learning about my own faith and about Christianity; I have found Adult Group thought-provoking, the Gatherings moving, the people lively. So my relationship to IFFP seems to be shifting. We came, originally, so Miranda could attend Sunday School. We seem to be staying so that Mom can learn and grow.
